## OVERVIEW

This month we are exploring the theme of waiting on God.

## SESSION ONE: WAITING FOR GOD TO MAKE A MOVE!

In Session One we'll start to explore the theme of waiting as we look at the story of Daniel. He spent most of his life in exile, waiting for God to make his move. Through the waiting, Daniel committed to a life of prayer and worship. He trusted in God's faithfulness, and in this session we will get the opportunity to follow in Daniel's footsteps.

## SESSION TWO: WAITING FOR AN ANSWER

In Session Two we find Hannah waiting for God to answer her prayer. Crushed by the weight of the expectations of others, and her own desperate desire for a child, Hannah waited on God to give her a son. She was in a different time and place but her story and experience is relevant to us today. In this session we find out how Hannah's story links to ours.

## SESSION THREE: WAITING FOR THINGS TO GET BETTER

David was lined up to be the next king. He was popular at the royal court, successful in battle and had the world at his feet. Then everything changed! In today's session we go deep into the cave with David and experience what it feels like to lose everything. After nearly ten years of exile, David was desperate for things to get better. In this session we'll learn from David how to live out our faith while we're waiting to climb out of the cave.

### SESSION FOUR: WAITING FOR THINGS TO WORK OUT

Many of us like to know what's next, what the plan is and how things are going to pan out. It makes us feel safe and secure to know that God has a plan for us. What if that plan is more a purpose? Would that help us to navigate life when we are waiting for things to work out? In this session we consider the life of John Mark with all its twists and turns. There were many moments where life didn't go to plan for him, and yet God used this young disciple to grow into an essential part of the early Church. God is able to work in us and through us while we are waiting for things to work out.

### SESSION FIVE: WAITING WELL

In this final session we revisit Daniel as he enters old age. He watched many kings pass through the palace, experienced times in the limelight and moments of obscurity. Throughout it all he waited on God. Right to the end Daniel prayed for God's guidance and wisdom, and there is much he can teach us about waiting well.

Any text in italics represents notes for the leader. It gives more context around the Scripture/activity. You may choose to share verbatim, summarise or not share at all.



## WAITING FOR GOD TO MAKE A MOVE!

SESSION ONE

## WELCOME

Discuss the names of the group members together.

The following questions are closed, but encourage the group to explain their yes/no answers.

🗩 Do you know what your name means? If so, share it with the group. If not, then do a quick search and find out.

- 🗩 Do you like your name?
- Are you named after anyone?

🗩 Do you have the kind of name that people spell or pronounce incorrectly? How does that make you feel?

If you could choose a different name, what would it be?

Names are an important part of our identity and this was particularly the case in biblical times. As we start to explore the theme of 'waiting', the first Bible character we are going to consider is Daniel. In a short space of time Daniel's life was transformed by circumstances beyond his control. Everything changed for Daniel, and he spent his life waiting on God to resolve the situation.

## WORD

We have already introduced the character of Daniel found in the Old Testament.

Read Daniel 1:1-5 to find out what happened to him as a teenager.

'In the third year of the reign of Jehoiakim king of Judah, Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came to Jerusalem and besieged it. And the Lord delivered Jehoiakim king of Judah into his hand, along with some of the articles from the temple of God. These he carried off to the temple of his god in Babylonia and put in the treasure house of his god.

Then the king ordered Ashpenaz, chief of his court officials, to bring into the king's service some of the Israelites from the royal family and the nobility – young men without any physical defect, handsome, showing aptitude for every kind of learning, well informed, quick to understand, and qualified to serve in the king's palace. He was to teach them the language and literature of the Babylonians. The king assigned them a daily amount of food and wine from the king's table. They were to be trained for three years, and after that they were to enter the king's service.'

- DANIEL 1:1-5

Place yourself in Daniel's position. How would it feel to experience what he did?

## L ) OUTLINES

Daniel's name meant 'God is my judge', but it was changed to 'Belteshazzar' which meant 'Bel protect his life.' Bel was one of the Babylonian gods.

SESSION ONE



What impact do you think this name change had on Daniel?

🏓 Have you ever had an experience where it felt like too many things changed all at the same time? If you feel comfortable, then share with the group.

Daniel's world was turned upside down. He had no idea how long the exile would last, but as time passed the Israelites continued to wait desperately for God to make his move.

After watching the clip, discuss the following questions:

- What were the two main ways the people responded to their challenging situation?
- What third way did Jeremiah suggest?
- How did Daniel and his friends live out Jeremiah's 'third way'?
- How do you think Daniel felt after a dream revealed that he would have to wait a long time for the exile to end?
- 🗩 Do you agree with the clip when it says, 'We all live and work in Babylon'? Explain your answer.
- How did Jesus show us how to live lives of loyalty and subversion?

The title of this session is 'Waiting for God to make a move!'. Although we know that God is present in every situation we face, it can still be frustrating when we feel like we are waiting for him to take action.

Describe a situation where you are waiting for God to 'make a move'.

When we want God to 'make a move' we usually mean that we want him to resolve the situation quickly.

How can we learn from the example of Jesus and Daniel as we wait for the resolution of a challenging situation?

Discuss the following quote:

## ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

In Daniel 2, King Nebuchadnezzar's petulance puts Daniel's life in danger. After many sleepless nights the king couldn't find anyone able to interpret his troubling dream. Frustrated with the wise men in court, he ordered their execution. Daniel and his friends faced the same fate. As was the pattern throughout his life, Daniel immediately turned to God in prayer to find a way through. He spent the night praying with his friends and God revealed the meaning of the dream.

#### Read Daniel 2:17-23.

What do these verses reveal about Daniel's ability to keep trusting God throughout his exile experience?



## WORSHIP

What do you think Steven Furtick means in the following quote?

How does our impatience when waiting on God get us into trouble?

Whether we are waiting for God to make a move in the war on Ukraine, or waiting for a resolution to a health issue, fears and worries can consume our minds. In the next part of the session we will focus on a few areas in our lives where we are waiting on God. Before we do that, our time of worship today reminds us of the God we pray to.

SESSION ONE

#### PRAYER

#### ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

The theologian NT Wright describes worship in the following way:

'True worship is open to God, adoring God, waiting for God, trusting God even in the dark.'

How do you see the link between waiting and worship?

## WITNESS

We're going to follow Daniel's example as we think about the situations where we are waiting on God. To do that we need a quick recap of one of the events that happened later in Daniel's life. The clip is very obviously not aimed at your age group but it will get us up to speed with what's been going on with Daniel. The full story is found in Daniel 6.

No matter the circumstances, no matter the adversity, Daniel had a clear pattern of prayer that he followed daily. We could easily look at Daniel's story and conclude that he got his answer to prayer quickly as he was saved from the lions' den. However, remember that he was still in exile, and still waiting for God to make a move.

SESSION ONE

Over the next four weeks we're going to follow Daniel's pattern of prayer, bringing our concerns to God three times a day. You don't have to pray in your bedroom with the windows wide open, but there will be three times during the day where you pray as you wait on God to respond.

Give each member of the group a 'Waiting on God' prayer handout.

Throughout today's session the young people have had an opportunity to think about situations they are facing that feel unresolved. These situations may link to world events, or personal circumstances, but in all of them there will be a sense of wanting God to make a move and improve things. The prayer handout provides the opportunity for the young people to consistently pray, three times a day, about a situation where they would like God to move.

Discuss the different parts of the handout and give the young people time to complete the first few sections. If appropriate, share each prayer focus and commit to praying over the next four weeks.

This activity will be followed up in the final session where we will visit Daniel's story again.

### ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

We often start an activity like this with the best intentions, but then three times a day quickly becomes once a day or not at all.

What strategies can we put in place as a group to hold each other accountable to praying regularly for the next four weeks?

## WAITING ON GOD

'When Daniel learned that the decree had been signed and posted, he continued to pray just as he had always done. His house had windows in the upstairs and opened towards Jerusalem.

## UTLINES

SESSION TWO

## WFLCOME

Waiting can be challenging, especially if we are looking forward to something or really need something to happen.

When you think about having to wait, what scenario comes to mind? For example: Waiting for a ride at a theme park, waiting at A&E, waiting for football club season tickets, or waiting for food to arrive etc.

After discussing the scenarios, divide the group into teams. Ask each team to choose one scenario and share it with everyone.

Each team has five minutes to create a 'Waiting Game' that could be played while waiting for this particular scenario. The dafter the better!

After five minutes ask each team to share their 'Waiting Game'. Which one is the group's favourite?

## ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

After the group have chosen their favourite game, have a go at playing it together.

## W/ORD

As we think about the frustration of waiting for God to answer prayer, we are going to turn to the first book of Samuel in the Old Testament. Here we meet Hannah, who had been praying for something specific for a long time.

Just like the last session, the clip we are going watch is not aimed at your age group but it simplifies Hannah's story and summarises how she waited on God. It also includes the happy ending!

In the clip, Hannah's story of waiting is reduced to 64 seconds and is simplified for a younger audience. We're going to spend time discussing some of the statements from the clip and explore how Hannah must have felt as she waited on God.

Statement One: Hannah was married to a man named Elkanah but they were not able to have any children. This made Hannah sad.



#### 📕 Read 1 Samuel 1:1-2.

'There was a certain man from Ramathaim, a Zuphite from the hill country of Ephraim, whose name was Elkanah son of Jeroham, the son of Elihu, the son of Tohu, the son of Zuph, an Ephraimite. He had two wives; one was called Hannah and the other Peninnah. Peninnah had children, but Hannah had none.'

-1 SAMUEL 1:1-2

What additional information do we find out from these verses?



- How do you think Hannah felt about Peninnah having children?
- As you place Hannah in history, what kind of social and cultural pressures do you think she felt when it came to having children?

SESSION TWO

How would you expand on the statement, 'Hannah was sad'?

**Leader's notes:** Just in case the question of polygamy is raised, then the following information from the Biblical Theology Study Bible may be useful:

'Monogamy predominates in the Old Testament, it is God's design for humanity (Genesis 2:18-25). But there are a few instances of men having more than one wife, such as Abraham, Isaac, David, and Solomon. The latter may mostly be explained by political factors such as treaty marriages. Hannah is presumably Elkanah's first wife; because she is barren, Elkanah may have felt it necessary to take a second wife and continue the line of inheritance through her.'

#### Statement Two: 'It's OK.'

In the clip Elkanah says, 'It's OK' to Hannah, but in the Scripture those around Hannah respond differently.

#### 📕 Read 1 Samuel 1:3-8.

'Year after year this man went up from his town to worship and sacrifice to the Lord Almighty at Shiloh, where Hophni and Phinehas, the two sons of Eli, were priests of the Lord. Whenever the day came for Elkanah to sacrifice, he would give portions of the meat to his wife Peninnah and to all her sons and daughters. But to Hannah he gave a double portion because he loved her, and the Lord had closed her womb. Because the Lord had closed Hannah's womb, her rival kept provoking her in order to irritate her. This went on year after year. Whenever Hannah went up to the house of the Lord, her rival provoked her till she wept and would not eat. Her husband Elkanah would say to her, "Hannah, why are you weeping? Why don't you eat? Why are you downhearted? Don't I mean more to you than ten sons?"

-1 SAMUEL 1:3-8

Summarise the responses of Peninnah and Elkanah in modern-day language.

In what ways do we need to be careful when we respond to those around us who are waiting for God to answer their prayers?

Statement Three: Hannah was so upset that one of the priests, Eli, thought there was something 'off' about her.

#### *[* Read 1 Samuel 1:12-14.

'As she kept on praying to the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying in her heart, and her lips were moving but her voice was not heard. Eli thought she was drunk and said to her, "How long are you going to stay drunk? Put away your wine.""

-1 SAMUEL 1:12-14

The fact that, in a place of worship, Eli the priest assumed that a praying woman was a drunkard was a poor reflection on the spiritual health of the people of Israel at that time. Instead of seeing Hannah's desperation, Eli passed judgement.

What assumptions do we often make about people who are facing challenging situations?

How can we avoid falling into the trap of judging others when we don't know the full story?

Statement Four: Hannah told him that she had been praying because she had a broken heart.

#### Read 1 Samuel 1:15-20

"Not so, my lord," Hannah replied, "I am a woman who is deeply troubled. I have not been drinking



wine or beer; I was pouring out my soul to the Lord. Do not take your servant for a wicked woman; I have been praying here out of my great anguish and grief." Eli answered, "Go in peace, and may the God of Israel grant you what you have asked of him." She said, "May your servant find favour in your eyes." Then she went her way and ate something, and her face was no longer downcast. Early the next morning they arose and worshipped before the Lord and then went back to their home at Ramah. Elkanah made love to his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. So in the course of time Hannah became pregnant and gave birth to a son. She named him Samuel, saying, "Because I asked the Lord for him."

SESSION TWO

#### -1 SAMUEL 1:19-20

Hannah surrendered her worries and concerns to God. She didn't have an immediate answer, but she did have peace.

What lessons can we learn from Hannah's experience of waiting on God?

## Statement Five: Hannah prayed and gave thanks to God and Samuel grew up in the Temple serving the Lord.

When Hannah's prayer was answered, she didn't move straight on to the next prayer request. Instead, Hannah took time to praise God and thank him for his faithfulness.

When God answers prayer, do you take time to thank him? If so, how do you do this?

#### ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

Hannah's prayer of thanks reminds us all how important it is to reflect on God's love and make time to say thank you.

Read Hannah's prayer (1 Samuel 2:1-10) taken from The Message paraphrase.

What words and phrases stand out for you?

Hannah prayed:	
I'm bursting with God-news!	
I'm walking on air.	
I'm laughing at my rivals.	
I'm dancing my salvation.	
Nothing and no one is holy like God,	
no rock mountain like our God.	
Don't dare talk pretentiously –	
not a word of boasting, ever!	
For God knows what's going on.	
He takes the measure of everything that happens.	
The weapons of the strong are smashed to pieces,	
while the weak are infused with fresh strength.	
The well-fed are out begging in the streets for crusts,	
while the hungry are getting second helpings.	
The barren woman has a houseful of children,	
while the mother of many is bereft.	
God brings death and God brings life,

For the very structures of earth are God's; he has laid out his operations on a firm foundation. As you reflect over the past few years, what prayers has God answered?

If you feel comfortable, then share them with the group.

## WITNESS

Hannah's culture deemed her 'less than' because she was childless. Although Hannah genuinely wanted a child, she must have felt suffocated by the expectations of others. Hannah's story took place in biblical times, but as followers of God we still face similar struggles today.

SESSION TWO

Leader's notes: Discussion questions are provided below for this section but it will mainly be led by the circumstances of the young people. They may want to relate Hannah's story to the situations they are currently waiting for and praying about. These could include waiting for exam results, choosing the right apprenticeship or university, job hunting or health concerns. The discussion may also cover areas where it feels like there's no good reason for God to say no to a prayer request, but still, they are waiting. The aim of the discussion is to share what is on their heart and discuss the frustration that can come with unanswered prayer. Drawing on Hannah's example of praise and thanksgiving, the group could also discuss the speed at which we move on when our prayers are answered.

Suggested discussion questions:

- 🗩 Hannah felt societal pressure to have children. What kind of societal and cultural pressures do you feel?
- What expectations do you feel that you currently have to meet?
- Do you think these expectations are in line with what God wants for you?
- Is there anything that you're praying for that you cannot understand why God hasn't said yes to? If you feel comfortable, then share with the group.
- 🗩 How does our faith grow and develop while we are waiting for God to answer our prayers?

### ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

In the first session we started a focus prayer journey based on Daniel's experience of waiting on God.

- How is it going so far?
- Has there been any progress with the situation you are praying about?
- 🗩 Do you need to adjust what you are praying for? If so, in what way?

## WORSHIP

For each of the sessions in this series there is a song linked to the theme of waiting. Today's song reflects the quiet determination of Hannah to keep praying, even when she couldn't understand what God was doing.

## CELL OUTLINES

Read through the lyrics of the song 'Thy Will' before you listen to it.

How do the lyrics reflect your experience of waiting on God?

SESSION THREE

## WELCOME

Today we're going deep into the cave with David in the Old Testament.

What feelings immediately come to mind when you think about going into a cave?

Watch the clip and then discuss which cave you would most/least like to visit.

Our sense of danger may increase when we enter a deep cave, but as the video shows, they can also be places of amazing beauty. While waiting for things to get better, David had to spend time in a cave. In today's session we'll discover how this experience took his faith to a new place.

## ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

Are there any caves in your local area that you could go and visit as a group? If so, a trip there might give you a fresh perspective on David's experience in the cave.

## WORD

Give each member of the group a 'Waiting for things to get better' handout. There are a lot of Scripture readings to cover on this handout but the aim is to skim read the passage and summarise the main events to track David's journey. Discuss the Scriptures and questions on the handout by following the arrows and use the additional information below to supplement the discussion.

#### 1 Samuel 16:1-13 (Samuel anoints David)

God had rejected King Saul and wanted to put in place a new king for the future. Jesse lined up his sons to present to Samuel, but left David working in the fields. It didn't even cross his mind that David would make the cut. When the eldest son, Eliab, was presented to Samuel, God had something to say about it!

'But the Lord said to Samuel, "Do not consider his appearance or his height, for I have rejected him. The Lord does not look at the things people look at. People look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart."

#### 1 Samuel 16:7

As a teenager, and at God's command, David was anointed by Samuel as the future king.

#### 1 Samuel 16:14-23 (David in Saul's service)

David was taken from his father's field to the royal court. There he soothed the king's tormented spirit, and Saul sent word back to David's father saying:

'Allow David to remain in my service, for I am pleased with him.'

-1 SAMUEL 16:22



#### 1 Samuel 17:1-54 (David and Goliath)

This is a long Scripture passage to read in full, but the summary is that David, through God's help, was able to defeat Goliath.

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#### 1 Samuel 18:1-7 (David is successful in battle)

Up to this point, how were things going for David? He was living out God's purpose for his life and it was going well. He was successful in battle and forging close relationships with members of the royal family. Everything seemed to be going to plan.

#### 1 Samuel 18:8-9; 19:1-3; 23:7-8 (The tide turns for David)

Due to the king's jealousy, the tide turned for David and he found that he was reduced from the position of future king to a fugitive on the run.

At this point on the handout there is a place for the young people to jot down all the faith questions David may have been grappling with. For example:

Why is God doing this when I've only ever done what he asked?

When will this be over?

🗩 Will I ever be king?

Did I misunderstand what God wanted for me?

#### Read 1 Samuel 24:1-14

What happened in the cave at En Gedi?

## WITNESS

Watch the clip that gives context to David's time in the cave at En Gedi.

In the clip we discovered the next part of David's fall from favour with the king. He had so much hope and promise ahead of him but now he was ten years into a period of exile and isolation.

Discuss the following questions in response to the content of the clip:

What can we learn from David when we are waiting for things to get better?



### ADDITIONAL ACTIVITY

Read Psalm 57 from *The Message* paraphrase. This is one of the psalms thought to have been written during David's time in exile.

How does this psalm teach us to 'wait well' when we want things to get better?

Be good to me, God—and now! I've run to you for dear life. I'm hiding out under your wings until the hurricane blows over. I call out to High God, the God who holds me together. He sends orders from heaven and saves me, he humiliates those who kick me around. God delivers generous love, he makes good on his word. I find myself in a pride of lions who are wild for a taste of human flesh; Their teeth are lances and arrows, their tongues are sharp daggers. Soar high in the skies, O God! Cover the whole earth with your glory! - PSALM 57 (THE MESSAGE PARAPHRASE) They booby-trapped my path; I thought I was dead and done for. They dug a mantrap to catch me, and fell in headlong themselves. I'm ready, God, so ready, ready from head to toe, Ready to sing, ready to raise a tune: "Wake up, soul! Wake up, harp! wake up, lute! Wake up, you sleepyhead sun!" I'm thanking you, God, out loud in the streets, singing your praises in town and country. The deeper your love, the higher it goes; every cloud is a flag to your faithfulness. Soar high in the skies, O God! Cover the whole earth with your glory!

## WORSHIP

Would that help us to navigate life when we are waiting for things to work out? Today we consider the life of John Mark with all its twists and turns. There were many moments where life didn't go to plan for John Mark and yet God used them to help this young disciple grow into an essential part of the early Church. God is able to work in us and through us while we are waiting for things to work out.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Why do you think Jeremiah 29:11 is such a favourite verse with Christians across the world?

This verse is often taken out of context and interpreted that if we just follow the plan God has for us then everything will work out perfectly. But life's not like that. However, we do like to know what's next and this verse provides the reassurance that a plan is in place.

Does our idea of God's plan for us match up with the experiences of characters in the Bible? Do these characters always follow the plan perfectly?

Today we're going to meet John Mark and see how God's purpose for his life took him on a journey with many twists and turns.

People often say, 'Where were you when...?' and then add some historical event.

#### Read Mark 14:43-51:

'Just as he was speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, appeared. With him was a crowd armed with swords and clubs, sent from the chief priests, the teachers of the law, and the elders. Now the betrayer had arranged a signal with them: "The one I kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." Going at once to Jesus, Judas said, "Rabbi!" and kissed him. The men seized Jesus and arrested him. Then one of those standing near drew his sword and struck the servant of the high priest, cutting off his ear. "Am I leading a rebellion," said Jesus, "that you have come out with swords and clubs to capture me? Every day I was with you, teaching in the temple courts, and you did not arrest me. But the Scriptures must be fulfilled." Then everyone deserted him and fled. A young man, wearing nothing but a linen garment, was following Jesus. When they seized him, he fled naked, leaving his garment behind.'

See if you can find John Mark in this story. How would he answer the question, 'Where were you when Jesus was arrested?'

Many scholars believe that John Mark was the young man fleeing the scene in his birthday suit! This young man went on to have an amazing adventure with the disciples, but it wasn't without its ups and downs.

The following clip is quite long but gives an overview of the life of John Mark and the twists and turns on his journey. As the group watch the clip, ask them to think about the following questions and discuss them at the end.

🗩 Do you think God had a clear plan for John Mark or a clear purpose, or both?

🗩 What do we learn about waiting from John Mark's spiritual journey?

Discuss the questions the young people have considered throughout the clip.

If you're searching for a perfect plan to follow so that everything falls into place, then John Mark shows us that that's not the way God works. There may not be a perfect plan but there is a perfect purpose. As the clip says:

'The Holy Spirit will empower you to have the right values and to be courageous in the cause of Christ if you allow him to.'

While you're waiting for things to work out, follow John Mark's example and keep living out God's purpose for your life.

## WITNESS

What are you waiting for? What feels unresolved?

If we're not careful, we move through life waiting for the next thing to work out. Instead of taking in the moment, we move on to the next thing, and the next thing and ...

Read the extract from *Cold Tangerines* written by Shauna Niequist and discuss the questions together (also available as a handout).

'I have always, essentially, been waiting. Waiting to become something else, waiting to be that person I always thought I was on the verge of becoming, waiting for that life I thought I would have. In my head, I was always one step away. In high school, I was biding my time until I could become the college version of myself, the one my mind could see so clearly. In college, the post-college "adult" person was always looming in front of me, smarter, stronger, more organized. Then the married person, then the person I'd become when we have kids. For twenty years, literally, I have waited to become the thin version of myself, because that's when life will really begin.

And through all that waiting, here I am. My life is passing, day by day, and I am waiting for it to start. I am waiting for that time, that person, that event when my life will finally begin. I love movies about "The Big Moment" – the game or the performance or the wedding day or the record deal, the stories that split time with that key event, and everything is reframed, before it and after it, because it has changed everything. I have always wanted this movieworthy event, something that will change everything and grab me out of this waiting game into the whirlwind in front of me. I cry and cry at these movies, because I am still waiting for my own big moment. I had visions of life as an adventure, a thing to be celebrated and experienced, but all I was doing was going to work and coming home, and that wasn't what it looked like in the movies.

John Lennon once said, "Life is what happens when you're busy making other plans." For me, life is what was happening while I was busy waiting for my big moment. I was ready for it and believed that the rest of my life would fade into the background, and that my big moment would carry me through life like a lifeboat.

The Big Moment, unfortunately, is an urban myth. Some people have them, in a sense, when they win the Heisman or become the next American Idol. But even that football player or that singer is living a life made up of more than that one moment. Life is a collection of a million, billion moments, tiny little moments and choices, like a handful of luminous, glowing pearls. It takes so much time, and so much work, and those beads and moments are so small, and so much less fabulous and dramatic than the movies.

But this is what I'm finding, in glimpses and flashes: this is it. This is it, in the best possible way. That thing I'm waiting for, that adventure, that move-score-worthy experience unfolding gracefully. This is it. Normal, daily life ticking by on our streets and sidewalks, in our houses and apartments, in our beds and at our dinner tables, in our dreams and prayers and fights and secrets – this pedestrian life is the most precious thing any of use will ever experience.'

## WELCOME

This is our final session looking into the theme of 'Waiting on God'. We've met lots different Bible characters who, through their stories, have given us advice on how to wait well. We often learn from the experiences of others as we watch them make decisions and listen to their words of wisdom.

Even though he was still waiting for an answer, Daniel prayed to God from his first days in Babylon through to old age.

Explain your thoughts as you answer these questions.

Do you think there may have been times when Daniel wondered if God was listening?



In Daniel 10:12 (The Message paraphrase) God sent an angel to reassure Daniel that he had heard every prayer he had spoken:

"Relax, Daniel," he continued, "don't be afraid. From the moment you decided to humble yourself to receive understanding, your prayer was heard, and I set out to come to you."

How do you think these words made Daniel feel?

Do you find them reassuring for yourself? If so, why?

Intertwined throughout the Bible is a story of waiting. The people of Israel are waiting for a Messiah and the book of Daniel plays an integral part in that journey.
