Praying in Distress

It is hard to pray when you're hurting, especially when that hurt has lasted a long time.

It's hard to pray when we have to watch the suffering of others, especially when it seems to make no sense. It is sometimes hard to pray in recovery, because we are moving away from past hurts. It is an act of courage that will take everything we have.

Remember...

- It's not always possible to find a safe place to pray. But if you can, move to somewhere safe, and perhaps to a place where you can be supported.
- Know that in our distress and suffering, God wants us to know his protecting presence even more.
- Throughout the Bible people have called to God in the worst circumstances:
 - How long, Lord, must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long? **Psalm 13:2, NRSV**Give ear to my prayer, O God. My heart is in anguish, the terrors of death have fallen upon me. **Psalm 55:1, NRSV**
- Cry, scream, shout out to Jesus. There are no niceties in this situation – you need to know God's presence now; and he seeks out those who are suffering
- When you can, concentrate on your breathing. Try to slow it down. As your breathing slows say the name of Jesus, or just one word to represent your prayer. Remember you are not alone.

Imagine God holding you, keeping you safe.

When you can, notice what is happening in your body. Are you hurting anywhere?

Is there an ache in your chest, a lump in your throat, a knot in your stomach, a pain in your forehead?

What are you feeling right now – anger, fear, guilt? Just take time to notice that this is what is happening. What is this all saying to you?

Imagine Jesus with you right now wanting to heal that pain. Can you give it to him? Stay with Jesus in this place until you are ready to move.


