OUR COURSES

BITESIZE COURSES

These are short, single pieces of work that aim to introduce you to a range of different topics. They are available at Award, Foundation and Starter levels. These courses are helpful to make sure that you are working at the right level for you.

STARTER COURSES

These are mainly in workbook form, and there are worksheets to be completed for each lesson. These studies are suitable for studients who don't have a comprehensive knowledge of the Bible, or who are not used to doing written studies. If you are a new Christian, who wants to learn about the Christian faith, or other faiths, you will find these courses helpful.

FOUNDATION COURSES

These courses require short pieces of written work. They provide introductory information on your chosen subjects and aim to encourage further reading and study.

AWARD LEVEL COURSES

These courses aim to encourage and equip you for in-depth study. Each one has a set textbook and additional reading is also suggested. Assignments vary and include, but are not limited to, writing essays. These courses also encourage you to explore and apply what you learn to your own life.

STARTER LEVEL

Biblical Studies and Prayer

PRAYING THE JESUS PRAYER

This bitesize course introduces you to the method of prayer known as the Jesus Prayer and guides you through using it for the first time.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: What Is the Jesus Prayer? Praying the Prayer

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the New International Version of the Bible.

BALAAM'S DONKEY

This bitesize course introduces you to the story of Balaam's Donkey and what it means for you.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: The Grumpy Donkey What Does it Mean for Us?

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the NIV Bible.

Course fee: £10 Course reference: BSS2

UNDERSTANDING THE TRINITY

This bitesize course introduces you to the Christian understanding of God as Trinity.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: What Is the Trinity? What Does the Bible Say?

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the NIV Bible.

PLEASE TEACH US TO PRAY: PRAYING THE PRAYER JESUS TAUGHT US

This bitesize course introduces you to the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples to say in Luke chapter 11 verses 1-4.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Who Are We Speaking to? How Should We Speak to God? Praying for Ourselves: What Do We Really Need? Did You Notice...? What Does This Prayer Mean for Me and My Life?

This bitesize course helps you to think about the meaning of the word faith. If you have faith, does this mean you will never have any doubts?

GOD IS WITH US: EXPLORING THE PRESENCE OF GOD IN OUR LIVES

This bitesize course covers the prayer of affirmation, 'God is with us', which will bring you into the presence of God, just where you are at that moment of time when you need it most.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

FOUNDATION LEVEL

Biblical Studies - The Old Testament

DEBORAH - A WOMAN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This bitesize course introduces you to the story of Deborah and the role she played in God's plans for His people. This story is told in the Book of Judges. The stories in that book are challenging to read.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

RAHAB - A WOMAN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This bitesize course introduces you to the story of Rahab and the surprising role she played in God's plans for His people. You will also be encouraged to think about any way in which your study of this story has encouraged or challenged you about your own life today.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Help From an Unexpected Source Promises Kept A Challenging Story Thinking Personally

Reading: As well as the information provided, you are also encouraged to do some additional reading: Joshua chapter 2 and chapter 6, verses 16-25.

A BABY DRAWN OUT OF THE WATER - EXPLORING A SHORT OLD TESTAMENT STORY ABOUT WOMEN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This bitesize course explores the story of how Moses' mother and sister and the pharaoh of Egypt's daughter played an important part in God's plans to help his suffering people. It will also encourage you to think about how what you have learned gives you challenge or encouragement in your own life today.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content:

Setting the Scene and Exodus Chapter 1 Exploring the Story in Exodus Chapter 2:10 A God of Surprises Thinking Personally

Reading: As well as the information provided, you are also encouraged to do some additional reading: Exodus chapters 1-2 and chapter 3:1-12

MIDWIVES IN EGYPT - WOMEN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This bitesize course explores the story of Moses and the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. It also helps you to think about how God was at work, fulfilling his plans through ordinary women who made an important difference in a dangerous and difficult situation.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Setting the Scene Introducing the Pharaoh Meet the Midwives Thinking Personally

Reading: As well as the information provided, you are also encouraged to do some additional reading: Genesis chapter 41:57, Genesis chapter 47:27, Exodus chapter 1 Alexander, P, Atsander, D. GOD IS HERE AND I DIDN'T KNOW!

This bitesize course explores part of the Old Testament story of Jacob, a most unlikely person meeting God in the most unexpected places, as it is told in the Book of Genesis in the Old Testament.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

THE WOMAN OF ZAREPHATH - A WOMAN WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

This single lesson bitesize course introduces you to the story of an unnamed woman who quite unexpectedly supported the prophet Elijah in his ministry and was helped by God in return.

In this study you will be encouraged to explore what the Bible says about the worth of every human being. You will also be prompted to reflect on what difference this makes to our view of ourselves and other people.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

A REFLECTIVE STUDY ON BEREAVEMENT

This bitesize course is designed to help our understanding of loss and bereavement and its impact. It will also offer insight into how to support those affected by bereavement.

Method of study and assessment: A reflective journal. There are reflection spaces in which you are invited to write about your own thoughts and feelings as you work through the course.

Content: Looking at Loss Coping and Supporting

This course covers some significant losses. If you feel that you might appreciate some support as you work through the course, it would be helpful to think about where you can find that support now, before you start the course.

PRAYING THE JESUS PRAYER

This single lesson bitesize course introduces you to the method of prayer known as the Jesus Prayer. This is a prayer that is at the core of the spirituality of the Orthodox Church.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: What is the Jesus Prayer? Trinitarian Prayer Praying the Prayer

Reading: Course notes provided and the NIV Bible.

Course fee: £20 Course reference: BSA3

Biblical Studies - The Old Testament

EXPLORING OLD TESTAMENT STORIES: THE HEALING OF NAAMAN

This bitesize course explores the Old Testament story of the healing of a famous warrior. His story is told in 2 Kings 5: 1-19. You will also be encouraged to think about what this ancient story has to say to us today.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Setting the scene Weet the People: The Eminent Ones Weet the People: The People With No Names Weet the People: Naaman the Famous Hero Reflecting on the Story: What Does It Wean for Me?

Reading: Course notes provided.

Course fee: £20 Course reference: BSA2

CLASH OF KINGS

This bitesize course explores the relationship between Jesus and the Roman Emperor. This relationship will be looked at through the stories of the New Testament, contrasting the titles used to depict each person and placing this within the overall mission of Jesus.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Only One King Who is the Prince of Peace? The Coming of the Kingdom

Reading: Course notes provided and the NIV Bible. Course fee: £20 Course reference: BSA4

Biblical Studies: New Testament

STORIES JESUS TOLD: 'THERE WAS ONCE A MAN WHO HAD TWO SONS'

This bitesize course explores the story of the father and his two sons told by Jesus in Luke chapter 15:11-32. You will also be encouraged to think about what this story means for you today.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: Setting the Scene Meet the People: The Younger Son Meet the People: The Older Brother Meet the People: The Father Reflecting on the Story: What Does it Mean for Me?

Reading: Course notes provided and the NIV Bible.

Course fee: £20 Course reference: BSA5

A STUDY ON THE EPISTLE OF JAMES

This bitesize course looks at the Epistle of James. It is designed to help you understand the practical nature of faith and respond to the challenge to live a life of integrity, devoted completely to God.

Method of study and assessment: The assignments for this course require written answers to a choice of questions.

Content:

Overview of the Book of James Parallels to the Sermon on the Mount Echoes of the Book of Proverbs

Reading: Course notes provided. The NIV Bible, other Bible translations and/or dictionaries may be helpful.

Church History

THE REFORMATION

This bitesize course helps you learn about what the Reformation was, why it happened, and what it means for us today.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook.

Content: What Was the Reformation? Why Did the Reformation Happen? What Does the Reformation Mean for Us Today?

Reading: Course notes provided and the NIV Bible.

Life and Faith

DEMENTIA

This bitesize course on dementia and spiritual care is written from a personal perspective. It aims to introduce you to dementia and begins to look at a community model of spiritual care.

Method of study and assessment: The assignments for this course require written answers to a choice of questions.

STARTER LEVEL COURSES

YOU ARE MY GOD': A PERSONAL JOURNEY THROUGH FIVE PSALMS OF PRAYER AND PRAISE

This course is designed to help you grow in the Christian faith through an introductory study of five psalms.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: Psalm 139: 'Lord, You Know Me' Lesson 2: Psalm 140: 'Sovereign Lord, My Strong Deliverer' Lesson 3: Psalm 140: 'In You I Will Take Refuge' Lesson 4: Psalm 143: 'Teach Me to do Your Will' Lesson 5: Psalm 143: 'Every Day I Will Praise You'

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News or NIV Bible.

Course fee: £40 Course reference: S1

WALKING WITH GOD: LEARNING FROM THE LIVES OF FIVE OLD TESTAMENT CHARACTERS

This course introduces you to five people in the Old Testament: Abraham, Moses, Hosea, Nehemiah and Jonah. Their stories show us how they got to know God, discovered how to live his way and helped other people to do this too.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: Trusting in God - Abraham's Story Lesson 2: Talking With God - Moses' Story Lesson 3: Knowing God's Love - Hosea's Message Lesson 4: Refusing to Give Up - Nehemiah's Story Lesson 5: Going God's Way? - Jonah's Story

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the NIV Bible.

Course fee: £40 Course reference: S2

Biblical Studies - The New Testament

JOHN'S GOSPEL

There are four gospels in the New Testament: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. They are the first four books in the New Testament. Each Gospel tells the story of Jesus in its own way. This course provides you with an overview of the life of Jesus in John's Gospel.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: Who Is Jesus? Lesson 2: Jesus in Action Lesson 3: I Have Come in Order That You Might Have Life Lesson 4: Teaching the Disciples Lesson 5: A New Beginning

Reading: The course notes and the Good News Bible or NIV Bible. The Bible translation used in the workbook is Today's New International Version.

JESUS IN THE GOSPELS

This course introduces you to the story of Jesus as it is told in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. These are the first four books in the New Testament. Each Gospel tells the story of Jesus in its own way. This course will provide you with an overview of the life of Jesus by looking at all of the Gospels.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: New Beginnings Lesson 2: Preparing for Ministry Lesson 3: The Ministry of Jesus Lesson 4: The Friends and Enemies of Jesus Lesson 5: Jesus Dies - and Rises Aqain!

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the NIV Bible.

Course fee: £40 Course reference: \$4

THE STORY OF JESUS BY MARK

This course introduces you to the story of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus as it is told in Mark's Gospel.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: The Story Begins Lesson 2: Jesus Miracles and Parables Lesson 3: Following Jesus Lesson 4: Jesus in Jerusalem Lesson 5: The End of the Story - Or is It?

LEARNING FROM ANDREW - A FOLLOWER OF JESUS

This course introduces you to the story of Andrew, a man who was not famous but who made a real difference to the lives of some of the people around him. As you think about Andrew, this course will encourse you to think about how you can make a difference to the lives of some of the people around you too.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

ENCOUNTERS WITH JESUS

This course introduces you to five women who met with Jesus.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbook for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: Not Worth Noticing? The Widow in the Temple Lesson 2: She IB & Remembered Lesson 3: The Woman Who Would Not Give Up Lesson 4: Alone in the Crowd Lesson 5: Thev Met at a Well

Biblical Studies - Old and New Testament

WOMEN IN THE STORY OF GOD'S PEOPLE: LEARNING FROM THE LIVES OF FIVE WOMEN IN THE BIBLE

This course introduces you to some of the women in the Old and New Testaments who are part of the Bible's story of God and his people.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

Content: Five Lessons Lesson 1: The Yery First Woman Lesson 2: The Slave Girl Lesson 3: A Loyal Woman Lesson 4: A Young Woman Chosen by God Lesson 5: A Dearly Loved Woman

Reading: The workbook notes and the Good News Bible or the NIV Bible.

Christian Life and Faith

FIRST STEPS IN THE CHRISTIAN FAITH

This course introduces you to some of the passages in the Bible that can help you to grow in your new relationship with God.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE: AN INTRODUCTION FOR NEW STUDENTS

This course aims to help you understand more about the Bible. It suggests resources to help you to study it and encourages you to explore how it continues to speak to our lives today. We hope that at the end of this course you will feel able to undertake further study of the Bible using the skills you have gained.

Method of study and assessment: completion of workbooks for each lesson.

It is important to complete these and it will be helpful to have a writing pad and paper to make notes as suggested.

LEADING A PRAYER MEETING

This course introduces the essential elements required for leading a prayer meeting through from start to finish.

It is important to complete these and it will be helpful to have a writing paid and paper to make notes as suggested.

AN INTRODUCTION TO PASTORAL CARE

This course aims to provide an introduction to the field of pastoral care. Throughout the 6 lessons it provides information, and asks for learner participation, in order to explore some historical, biblical and contemporary concepts which are also related to the learner's personal experience and/or ministry. This course also considers vital aspects that surround the practice of providing pastoral care within a faith-based context, such as the possible dangers involved and how to develop good practice.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course participants will have: Begun to explore the nature of pastoral care in their own and a wider context Considered the core influence of the example of Jesus in pastoral relationships Explored what this might look like in contemporary pastoral practice Begun to establish what skills would enhance their pastoral care and where they might be obtained Reviewed the main factors involved in establishing a framework for safe practice Established a plan for dealing with difficult conversations in the pastoral care.

This course introduces you to the story of God's people, as recorded in the later part of the Old Testament, and aims to inspire and equip you for further study of it. The assignments also prompt reflection on Christian life and the development of resources for practical ministry.

Learning Outcomes:

Identify key events and characters in this part of the Old Testament story. Identify significant theological themes in the books studied. Explain the relevance of the Old Testament story to Christian life today.

Outline the content and meaning of each psalm studied. Where relevant, explain the references to the history of God's people. Explain the relevance of the psalms studied to contemporary Christian life and worship.

Lesson 6: Psalm 15 and Psalm 17 - Communal Praise and Lament

Explain your understanding of the relevance of the passage to life today. Explain your esronal response to the passage.

Salvation Army Distinctiveness

SALVATION ARMY HISTORY: PART 1 (1895 - 1912)

This course introduces you to the history of The Salvation Army from its beginnings in 1885 to the death of William booth in 1912. We will be covering this period over the course of ski lessons. Each lesson will cover a significant period or theme within the history of The Salvation Army. This should help you to form a picture of the social and religious circumstances that influenced the formation and growth of The Salvation Army. Lesson 2: The Early Days: 1865-1878 Lesson 3: The Salvation Army Commences: 1878-1890 Lesson 4: Social Work Lesson 5: Social Reform Lesson 6: The Army Consolidates: 1890-1912

Level: You should be prepared to undertake the key reading as well as find and use other appropriate study resources. Assignments for each lesson will consist of a total of 1600 words, which will require you to include references and bibliographies.

Reading: There are a number of very useful books on the history of The Salvation Army, which are still in print, and these have been included in the reading list, together with those that are out of print but you may be able to obtain from other sources. There are extensive notes included for each lesson that make reference to these works.

SALVATION ARMY HISTORY - PART 2 (1912-1978)

This course introduces you to the history of The Salvation Army from the death of its founder William Booth in 1912 to the centemary of the adoption of the name Salvation Army. We will be covering this period over the course of six lessons. Each of the lessons will cover a significant period or theme, within the history of The Salvation Army, which should help you to form a picture of the social and religious circumstances that influenced the formation and growth of The Salvation Army during the 20th century. You will also have the opportunity to examine how the Army responded to major events, such as the First and Second World Wars and the constitutional crisis of 1929.

Learning Outcomes: At the end of this the course you should be able to: Describe the social and religious conditions of Britain in the 20th century. Identify the significant events and people involved in the development of The Salvation Army. Recognise the social, religious and economic context in which The Salvation Army operated and the influences on its continuing development.

Content: This course consists of six lessons with each lesson covering a particular aspect of Salvation Army history. Lesson 1: The Dynasty Continues Lesson 2: Redenship in Crisis Lesson 4: The Salvation Army at War Lesson 5: The Salvation Army at Peace Lesson 5: The Salvation Army at Peace

Level: You should be prepared to undertake the key reading as well as find and use other appropriate study resources. Assignments for each lesson will consist of a total of 1600 words, which will require you to include references and bibliographies.

Reading: There are a number of very useful books on the history of The Salvation Army, which are still in print, and these have been included in the reading list, together with those that are out of print but you may be able to obtain from other sources. There are extensive notes included for each lesson that make reference to these works.

Lesson 3: The Adventure of Explaining God as the Trinity (Doctrine 3)

Lesson 4: The Adventure of Explaining God as seen in Jesus (Doctrine 4)

Lesson 5: The Adventure of Dealing with Sin, the Problem (Doctrine 5)

Lesson 6: The Adventure of Dealing with Sin, the Solution (Doctrine 6)

Level: You should be prepared to undertake the key reading as well as find and use other appropriate study resources. Assignments for each lesson will consist of a total of f600 words, which will require you to include references and bibliographies. While this course is not an advanced study of doctrine, we do anticipate that you will be stimulated to think for yourself about the beliefs outlined and the issues raised. This course should help you not only to learn what Salvationis believe, but also bring you to a clearer understanding of what you believe.

Reading: The Salvation Army's Official Handbook of Doctrine published in 2010 is an essential accompaniment to the course notes. Lesson 6: The Continuing Adventure

EXTRACT FROM STARTER COURSE: AN INTRODUCTION TO JOHN'S GOSPEL LESSON 1

WHO IS JESUS?

In this study you will find out about some of the things John said about Jesus in the first four chapters of his Gospel. You will find it helpful to read John chapters 1 - 4 before you begin completing the workbook.

LIGHT AND LIFE What does John say about Jesus in verse 4?

You might be interested to know that light was the first thing that God made in the book of Genesis, the first book in the Bible. You can read about this in Genesis 1:3.

Today we can turn a light on in our homes whenever we need it. We have street lights and torches to help us to see in the dark. This was not so in Jesus' time. Stop and imagine for a moment a life with no light. How would your feel?

What do we need light for? List as many things as you can:

Without light, plants and crops we need for food cannot grow. People reading John's Gospel knew that during the darkness of night, they and their perclous flocks and herds were all more easily attacked by thieves and by enemies in wartime. They knew that it was very hard to find the right way and a safe path to travel when it was dark. Light gives life and it protects life, keeping it safe. Think about this for a moment.

John says that Jesus is 'the light of all people' in verse 4. What is John saying Jesus does for people?

In verse 5, what does John say about the darkness in relation to the light of Jesus?

EXTRACT FROM FOUNDATION LEVEL COURSE: JESUS IN THE GOSPELS LESSON 5 JOHN'S GOSPEL

WHAT WILL I LEARN ABOUT IN THIS LESSON?

Although each of the Gospels tell the story of Jesus in slightly different ways, they all agree on who Jesus was what he did and said. In this lesson you will discover some of the ways in which John's way of writing about Jesus is different from the other Gospels. Together with Matthew, Mark and Luke, what John has written helps to give us a fuller picture of Jesus.

At the end of this study you should be able to describe some of the features found only in John's Gospel, sum up some of Jesus' teaching in this Gospel and explain what it means for us today.

Reading: Alexander, P; Alexander, D. The Lion Handbook to the Bible Fifth Revised Edition. Oxford: Lion. (2017) You will find the information on John's Gospel on pages 621 - 642 in this book.

Pause for thought: In chapter 1 verses 10 - 13 John describes different peoples' responses to Jesus. What did John say about these different reactions and what happened for these people as a result? Do you think this is still true today?

Steps along the way: Only John tells us about the conversation with Nicodemus. You can read about this in chapter 3 verses 1-21. Lesus was teaching this religious leader about belonging to God's kingdom or, as John usually expresses it, receiving the eternal life only God can give (verses 3-8). How does Jesus say that this happens (verses 14-172! How would you explain this to someone today?

Assignments: You have a choice of questions to answer. Answer one question only. Your answer should total 750 words.

 a) In chapter 8 verse 12, Jesus says to the Pharisees '1 am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will have the light of tife and will never valk in darkness'.
 In chapter 9, in what ways has the life of the blind man changed because of his meeting with Jesus? (Look, for example, at 9: 24-38).
 What is the difference between the healed man and the Pharisees in this story?

b) Is this story and what it teaches important for us today? Explain what you think and why.

2. a) What did Jesus teach about the part played by the Holy Spirit in the lives of his followers in chapter 3 verses 1 - 21 and in chapter 14 verses 25 - 26?

b) Does this say anything to you that is important for your life today? Explain what you think and why.

3. a) Only John writes about Mary's meeting with Jesus while she was alone at the empty tomb and about Thomas's meeting with the risen Jesus. Describe either Mary's experience at tomo of Jesus and what she did after meeting Jesus in chapter 20 verses 11 - 18 or Thomas' meeting with the risen Jesus in chapter 20 verses 24 - 29. b) What did that meeting do for the person you chose to write about? Why were these meetings so important either to Mary or to Thomas? What does that say to us about knowing Jesus today? Explain what you think and why.

EXTRACT FROM AWARD LEVEL COURSE: JOHN'S GOSPEL LESSON 1

STUDY 1: INTRODUCING JOHN'S GOSPEL

What will I discover in this study? You will have an introductory overview of the background and content of John's Gospel. At the end of this study you should be able to give a summary of the following information about John's Gospel: authorship, the aim of the writer(s), John's relationship with the Synoptic Gospels, the portrayal of Jesus in John. You should also be able to explain how this helps with deeper understanding of the Gospel.

Reading:

Kevin Kruse pages 1-43 - Introduction and overview

John Drane's book, Introducing the New Testament Fourth Edition Oxford: Lion (2019), is helpful additional reading for anyone studying the New Testament. Pages 294-305 provide a brief and helpful introduction to John's Gospel.

Pause for thought - Can we trust John's Gospel?

Commenting on this, Drane (2019:296-8) admits that the differences between John and the Synoptics have in the past led to suggestions that John did not offer a reliable account of Jesus' life and ministry.

However, he points out that close studies of the differences lead to the realisation that John's information came free a different source. There are also instances where John's content can 'be used to supplement the information of the other Gospels in such a way as to make the whole story of Jesus' life and ministry more understandable' (2019:298). Drane goes on to offer examples of this.

D. Moody Smith New Testament Theology: The Theology of the Gospel of John.

Cambridge University Press: Cambridge, (1995) page 182 writes that, "The portrayal of Jesus in the Fourth Gospet reconates with that of the Jesus of the broader Gospet tradition and the New Testament generality, "Dane (2019):307) agrees: "For all the distinctiveness of the various stories about, Jesus, there is clearly an inner coherence in the Gospets as a whole and it is relatively easy to identify the key elements of his teaching as the fundamental aspects of it are the same in all four Gospets'. Chapter 11 of Drane's book is helpful reading if you want to think about the trustworthiness of the Gospets.

Steps along the way

The Old Testament spoke about 'signs and wonders' that showed God was present and active in the world and the lives of his people. Memories of God's activities (such as the exodus from slavery in Egypt, for example) were recorded and treasured.

Look at Joel 2:30. What does it say? How do you think this relates to the person and ministry of Jesus in John's Gospel?

Sayings: 'I am....'; John's Gospel also records significant sayings of Jesus - his 'I Am' statements.

Pause for thought:

Before reading any further, think about how many of these 'I Am' sayings you can remember. In what ways did Jesus describe himself?

Steps along the way:

Read the story of the encounter between Moses and God in Exodus chapter 3. Now look again at verses 9-14. What is John showing about Jesus in these statements that begin 'I am...'?

You can read Jesus' 'I am' savings in John 6:35 and 48: 8:12: 10:7, 11, 14: 11:25: 14:6: 15:1.

John shows Jesus describing himself using words that his listeners would instantly recognize as essential in everyage life – he speaks of himself as water, bread and light, for example, All human beings need these in order to stay alive. These are also images that were important in the Old Testament - for instance, in Exodus, God is shown providing his people with bread and water as they wandered in the vildenress after their escape from Egypt. John Onten places the 'I Am's statements of Jesus in the context of Jewish religious celebrations and Kruse explains the background to these and draws out the full significance of the images used by Jesus (see, for example, page 231).

You have a choice of questions to answer. You can EITHER:

Answer one question in depth. Your answer should total 1600 words.

OR:

You can choose to answer two questions, in which case each of your answers should total 800 words.

 Can John's Gospel be considered a reliable historical source for the ministry and teaching of Jesus? Give reasons for your opinion, making reference to the Gospel and to your reading.

Using both a chart, prepared by you and your own additional comments, compare John's Gospel with the Synoptic Gospels with reference to a) chronology and b) major differences in style and content.

3. How important do you think it is to know the background information to this Gospel that you have covered in this study as you read John? Explain why you think this, making reference to the Gospel and to your reading.
