Bible verses: Revelation 4:1-3; 21:1-4



Aim:

To learn about John's vision, explore what some of the pictures mean and think about what it means for us to have hope in what is to come



Today's fruit: **Patience**



Memory verse

'But God has told us what is good. This is what the Lord wants from us:

"You must be fair to other people," God

"You must want to be kind. And you must be careful to do what I show you."'

Start it

Today we are going to hear about something that happened to John, a disciple of Jesus.

Play a game of *Traffic lights*. Players walk or run depending on your space when the leader calls 'green light' and freeze when they call 'red light'. Some groups may know the version with 'amber' ... running on the spot. Ask them how it feels to be patient. What is something they are looking forward to and have to be patient for?

Alternatively, you could use 'The Bible App for Kids' downloaded on to a tablet for an interactive way to enjoy the Bible story.

Sit in a circle and ask the group to share together:

- What are you looking forward to? Do you have to wait a long time for it or a short time?
- Do you find it easy to wait for something?



 Being patient isn't always easy. Why is it important to try being patient?

John was shown an amazing new world. There would be no more pain. No one would be sad. No one would be hungry or thirsty. No one would die.

- This hasn't happened yet, so John is waiting a very long time! Why do you think God showed it to him?
- Who do you think was on the throne?
- What do you think it would be like to live there?
- Why do you think God wants to make a new world?

Games and activities to reinforce the Bible passage:

- Make: Paint or make a beautiful city or the 'world made new'.
- Play: Decorate a large cardboard box that children can enter, or make a tent with sheets. Decorate the space with ribbons, fairy lights or flowers, to represent the new city.
- Pray: Give each child a tissue. Pray together that God has promised to wipe away every tear. Children can mime wiping away tears as they pray.
- Try: Putting on some quiet music. As they close their eyes, ask them to imagine being with God in the new earth. Ask: What might it look, sound, feel like? You may like to read out a child-friendly version of the Bible passage to help them.
